Monday, March 6, 2023

In 1987, the first Presidential Proclamation was made which declared the first week of March as a time to elevate awareness of women's contributions to society. It began as a one-week celebration of women's contributions to culture, history and society organized by the school district of Sonoma, California. A few years later, the celebration went on to be recognized by other communities, school districts and organizations nationwide.

By 1980, President Jimmy Carter issued the first presidential proclamation declaring the week of March 8 as National Women's History Week. The following year, Congress passed a resolution establishing a national celebration. Finally, six years later, the National Women's History Project successfully petitioned Congress to expand the event to the whole month of March.

LNESC is also delighted to celebrate St. Patrick's Day, which falls during the Christian season of Lent. Irish families would traditionally attend church in the morning and celebrate in the afternoon.



LNESC CELEBRATES 50 YEARS IN CREATING LIFELONG LEARNERS 1973 - 2023







The LULAC National Educational Service Centers (LNESC) is commemorating the 50th anniversary in providing education and leadership programs for Hispanic and minority students. Through the efforts of 16 education service centers across the U.S., including Puerto Rico, and a host of national programs, we proudly celebrate the positive impact on the future leaders of our communities.

LNESC has assisted over 607,000 students on their path to higher education. With the support of partnerships representing many sectors, including 90 school partners, the LNESC national office, along with 16 education centers have:

- Annually served 14,000 students through education and leadership programs
- Awarded over \$30 million in scholarship funds to-date
- Sent 159,000 students to post-secondary education to-date
- Provided training and leadership development opportunities to over 550 students to-date through the Washington Youth Leadership Seminar
- Received the highest number of Department of Education TRIO program awards than any other non-profit organization or postsecondary institution



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

WHAT IS FENTANYL?

It is a prescription drug that is also made and used illegally. Like morphine, it is a medicine that is typically used to treat patients with severe pain, especially after surgery. It is also sometimes used to treat patients with chronic pain who are physically tolerant to other opioids. Tolerance occurs when you need a higher and/or more frequent amount of a drug to get the desired effects. In its prescription form, fentanyl is known by such names as Actig®, Duragesic®, and Sublimaze®.

Synthetic opioids, including fentanyl, are now the most common drugs involved in drug overdose deaths in the United States.

National Institute on Drug Abuse

What to do if you think someone is overdosing

- Call 911 Immediately.
- Administer naloxone (narcan).
- Try to keep the person awake and breathing.
- Lay the person on their side to prevent choking.
- Stay with the person until emergency assistance arrives.

Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that is about 50 to 100 times stronger than


Fentanyl is the singlest deadliest drug threat our nation has ever encountered.

Illicit Manufactured Fentanyl (IMF)

- Is available on the drug market in different forms, including liquid and powder.
- It looks like any drug.
- · It's mixed with drugs like heroin, cocaine, and methamphetamine and made into pills that resemble other opioids.



STRATEGIES TO **PREVENT YOUTH FROM USING DRUGS**



- · Give them praise
- Make one-on-one time
- Keep your cool
- · Connect with other parents



- · Make sure they know the legal circumstances of using drugs
- Volunteer at a substance abuse treatment center or a homeless shelter
 - · Do your homework
 - · Give them the facts
